In June, Bobby was elected to the Council and elected Vice-President. He joined "The Reporter" staff in November.

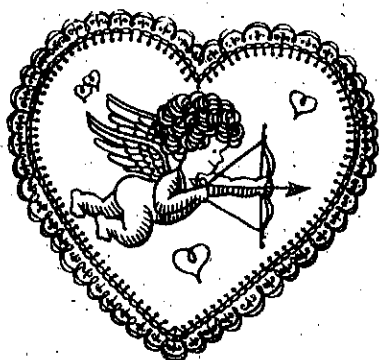
As President, Bobby will try to unite all of Highland Park. He would like to see a better relationship between all organizations to make Highland Park a better place to live and more tolerable.

Library News

The Internal Revenue Service has furnished the Highland Park Branch of the Louisville Free Public Library with a variety of materials to help taxpayers prepare their Federal Income Tax forms.

Commonly used tax forms and schedules can be obtained or photocopied. (We also have Kentucky Tax Form 740.)

The library has IRS Publication 1194, a four volume set of the IRS' most requested publications, and Publication 1132, which contains over 90 reproducible tax forms that can easily be photocopied for 10¢.

Also, Publication 910, the Taxpayer's Guide to IRS Information, Assistance & Publications, is available at the library. This publication contains useful year-round tips on how to obtain tax information.

Remember, librarians are not expected to serve as tax experts, but they will be able to direct the public to many helpful tax aids.

An Income Tax Help Program will be held at the Highland Park Library on February 4, 11 and 25. The program will start at 5:00 P.M. on all three dates.

Workshops Planned Sympathy

"A Smorgasbord of Workshops" will be held on Saturday, February 23, 9:00 A.M. to 12:30 P.M. at Noe Middle School, 121 West Lee Street.

The Neighborhood Development Cabinet will assemble a skilled group of people who have offered to share their knowledge on topics covering a variety of interests. These workshops range in appeal from money-saving "do-it-yourself" house repair and weatherization tips, to successful ways to "beef up" attendance and involvement in neighborhood associations and block watch clubs!

You will have a choice of attending a workshop in each of the morning's two sessions. Three workshops will be conducted simultaneously in the first 1½ hr. session and two different ones will be offered in the next 1½ hr. session which follows Session I.

SESSION I:

PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES

This deals with the "10 most common questions" citizens ask the Public Works Cabinet - "how do I obtain street lights, traffic signals, stop signs?" "Can I get a dumpster to dispose of junk?" Department Directors and their staff will give the presentation and answer all of your questions.

WHERE ARE THE FUNDS?

This explores the various sources of financial assistance available through City, State, County and Federal social service programs.

HOW TO INCORPORATE AND RECRUIT FOR YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION OR CLUB?

This will give management and recruiting techniques successful with neighborhood groups.

SESSION II:

HOME MAINTENANCE AND WEATHERIZATION

Topics will include "How Your House Works", "Energy Conservation", "Maintenance and Trouble-shooting". Panelists will include specialists in the various fields of construction and home improvement.

NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS' FINANCIAL PLANNING

This examines funding sources and financial management of neighborhood organizations.

All workshops are open at no cost to the public as a service of the Neighborhood Development Cabinet. Don't miss this "one time" opportunity! Bring your friends and neighbors.

Training

A new program of On-The-Job Training will be beginning soon called "Louisville Rebuilds".

This is a four month program, offering training in plumbing, painting, heating, electrical and carpentry. It is a 40 hour week of unpaid training. The instructor will be Tom Raymer.

You can apply if you are a Louisville or Jefferson County resident, are unemployed or underemployed, meet income guidelines, are at least 18 years of age and meeting the program entrance criteria.

Job placement and other client support services will be provided.
