Rev. J. Patrick "Pat" Roberts, husband of Betty Lou Ebersole Roberts and father of Jonathan Roberts, passed away recently.

Rev. Roberts had been pastor at Jones Memorial United Methodist Church for the past four years and has served in the Louisville Conference, which covers from Campbellsville to Bowling Green, for 30 years.

A native of Rose Hill, Va., Rev. Roberts moved to Louisville at the age of 7. A well-educated man, he had attended Kentucky Mountain Bible College, had a Bachelor Degree in Sociology from the University of Louisville and received his Master of Theology Degree from Chandler School of Theology at Emory University in Atlanta.

The call to preach came to Pat Roberts in his late teens while

attending a Scout Troop camp at Otter Creek, KY. There he saw a motto which became his life's pattern: "God First - Others Second - Self Last." Inez Hogan, a member of Jones Memorial said, "Rev. Roberts lived his life in such a way that his Christianity was always evident. He was greatly loved by his entire congregation."

"Come ye after me and I'll make you fishers of men," (Mark 1:17) was one of Rev. Roberts favorite scriptures. His interest in people transcended his local congregation and the Highland Park neighborhood. Pat Roberts was a man who cared immensely for every living person.

The two years he served on the Highland Park Neighborhood Association gave us an opportunity to touch hearts and minds with a

man whose daily walk was in Christ's path.

I, for one, am a better person for having known Rev. Roberts. I strongly suspect there are many, many more people who will echo my sentiments.

Rev. Roberts truly left an impact on the world in which he lived. Family, friends and acquaintances all share a real sense of loss at his passing.

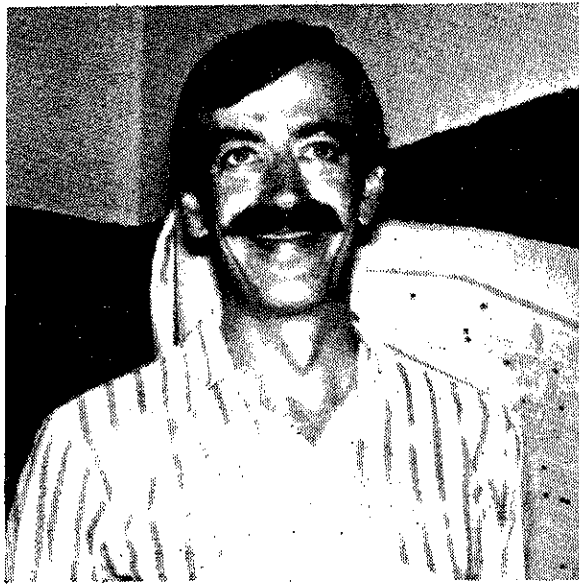
Aldermen Cut Tool Libraries

The Louisville Board of Aldermen passed the coming fiscal budget and announced a 20% cut in funds to Highland Park. The Council of the neighborhood association has been working toward becoming self-sufficient for some time now and we expect to be able to function with the cut.

The Aldermen shocked everyone with their elimination of tool libraries! They cut out all materials grants so we can't give members more paint, gutters, storm doors, etc. That cut we can manage. However, they also want us to turn over to Community Development all of the tools in the Highland Park Tool Library on October 1, 1982. Needless to say, the Council plans to fight a battle to keep our tools!

Just for your information, the only Alderman to speak up for us was Allan Steinberg, first ward alderman. Tom Lukins (who worked as our neighborhood organizer) is his aide and it would appear that Tom's experience with Highland Park and our tool library has at least made one alderman aware of the value of a tool library.

New Economic Developer ROD MOORE



Roderick Moore now serves the Highland Park Neighborhood Association as Economic Developer. He replaced Ken Shepherd who resigned last month.

Rod was raised in the small town of Lebanon, New Hampshire and moved to Louisville fifteen years ago. He earned an Accounting Degree from Pierce College of Business Administration and

has twenty years experience in the business field. A member of the National Guard, he transferred to the 2nd 138th Artillery which met at the Fairgrounds. The National Guard was activated in 1968 and he served with them in Ft. Hood and Vietnam.

He feels that his small town background was responsible for his early interest in neighborhoods. This interest developed further in working with the Louisville Tenants Union Inc. He was first introduced to our neighborhood when he was serving at the Fairgrounds, and since has served in several capacities that touched upon Highland Park. Currently Rod is busy learning about the neighborhood and meeting the residents, he also has a long list of projects to be working on for the benefit of the HPNA.

"I was pleased when I found that I would have the opportunity to work here. The people here have been real pleasant to me, they drop in, introduce themselves, fill me in on a little of the history of the neighborhood, and tell me a little about themselves. The people make me feel at home, and I think this will be a nice place to work."

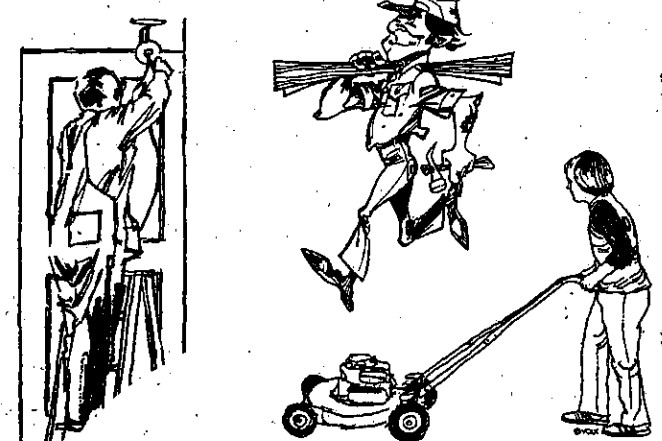
The Information Office is pleased to be able to act as a referral agent in Matching workers and needers. Arrangements as to time and expenses are your own to make.

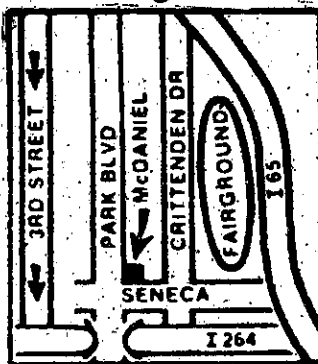

The Program Director is Mary Margaret Mulvihill, our former alderman.

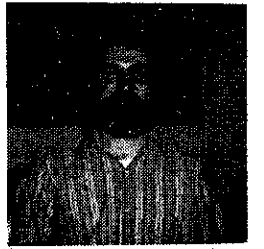

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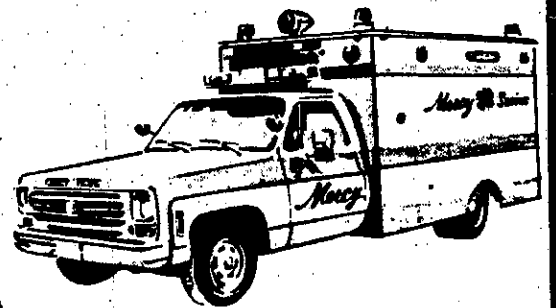
