

Have you noticed that Highland Park is beginning to look better? Vacant lots have had a trim, the alleys are being swept and cleaned.


Once again Highland Park is benefiting from the Mayor's Summer Youth Employment Program. Jim Price is once again the supervisor for the youth workers. His crew consists of eight members, both boys and girls.

Since June 29, when the program began in Highland Park, a change is already noticable. Five foot tall grass has been cut on a lot on Hiawatha Avenue, it is looking a lot cleaner under the Watterson Expressway and several alleys have received a face lift.

By the end of the summer, Highland Park will look a lot nicer. The workers are not allowed to work on private property, but all the work they are doing may give homeowners the incentive to clean up their own lots.

The Neighborhood Association will be operating several booths and volunteers are needed to help with the five or six game booths and the barbecue and hot dog booth.




