
Mrs. Hasch did all of the sorting, washing of clothes, pricing and hauling the items to the yard sale location.




Festival Update

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Utility Problems

On Tuesday, June 25 at 7:00 P.M. in the Salvation Army Building at 1010 Beecher Street, a public meeting will be held with local legislators to discuss utility problems. Many people are concerned about the frequent disruption of utility service for families who live on fixed and low incomes.

This meeting is planned to give your, the consumer, an opportunity to express to legislators concerns about:

- * the larger portion of your budget going for utilities' (at times going without needed medicine, food or rent)
- * amount of money needed to get service restored
- * continued threats of utility cut-offs
- * Winter cut-offs

There is one possible solution. Consumer groups are recommending that legislators support a "Guaranteed Service Plan" for household utilities.

We are paying high utility bills. Together we can make a difference. Changes have already occured in other states, however we need everyone's help. The first place to begin is with our legislators. Plan to attend this meeting.

Thursday, Friday & Saturday - 10:00 A.M. - 5:30 P.M.



Mora W. Gill of Park Blvd. would like to thank Mayor Harvey Sloane for the improved bus service to Highland Park. After Harding Avenue was closed to traffic, TARC changed the bus schedule and buses were coming through Highland Park only every two or three hours, most came only to Seneca Avenue and then out Crittenden Drive.

Mrs. Gill works downtown two days a week and needs the bus service.

Petitions were passed around and signed and pastors had members of their churches sign them also to have the schedule changed. Mrs. Gill then called the Mayor's Hotline and he talked to TARC officials. The Mayor came out to Highland Park with people from TARC. The Mayor then persuaded TARC to increase service.

The result is that now buses serve Highland Park about every half hour. Thank you Mayor Sloane and TARC!!!


