Celebration of Neighborhoods


CITY ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR THIS YEAR'S NEIGHBORHOOD CELEBRATION

PROJECT WARM!

It is not too early to be thinking about next winter. In fact, Project WARM is gearing up.

Project WARM, a simple "first-line" weatherization program active in Jefferson County has been operating for four years.

The concept of this successful program works like this: First, at an obligationfree presentation, the basic principles of heat loss and simple home winterization is explained. Also the basic format of how Project WARM works is presented.

Secondly, all interested volunteers are then scheduled for a "hands-on" service assignment at which they are taught the practical skills of installing simple weatherization materials. It will be held at the home of an eligible elderly of handicapped citizen of Jefferson County.

Next, the volunteer participant will be enrolled as an active Project WARM volunteer. He or she may work with the program at any time, at any place and with any other volunteer he or she chooses. After completing 3 successful service assignments (after "hands-on" training), the volunteer is then eligible to receive their own supply of free weatherization materials.

Service assignments will only be scheduled for the elderly and/or handicapped citizens of Louisville and Jefferson County who also live on a low income.
